Tid-Bits of Information

Essex Co. New Jersey was one of the original countiess into which New Jersey was divided and was established in 1682. It was reduced in size 1st by the formation of Morris Co. in 1738, 2nd by the formation of Union co in 1857, a small portion of the Co was taken from Somerset and Middlesex. Its boundries are the same to day.

Elizabethtown was first settled and named in 1665. It was incorporated as the Borough of Elizabeth 1739. Its territory then comprising nearly all now embraced in Union Co. It was reduced 1st by the formation of Rahway, 2nd by the formation of Springfield in 1793 3rd by the formation of Westfield in 1794. 4th by the formation Union, finally the formation of Lindeu in 1861, the remaining territory was incorporated as the city of Elizabeth, in 1855, no change has been made since.,

EDITORIAL

AI CORY, of Jacksonville, Fla. Eleventh Generation from John is now your News Letter Editor. As such I shall dedicate my self to the service of the National CORY Family Society by providing the Genealogical information to the best of my ability, from my personal files and that obtained from you the members. The objective of the News Letter is to disseminate this information to you. There is a lot of good information out there and also a lot of myths, through this letter and the help of the members we shall sort this out and set our records strait. I have in my computer over 6000 names in the data base, this includes the four CORY men that came to America in the 1600's through eleven generations on some families, with your help and family group sheets I shall be able to include your family up to todays generations. We the Society also needs information on any other CORY Family that have migrated to America from any other country in order to include them in the archival data base. I do know there are Cory's that landed in California during the 1800's but have not researched them, Please send in your family group sheets and talk to any one with the name CORY or that sounds like it, have them join the Society, They may bring us a new line. I will try to answer any question from all members of the Society personally if you send me a SASE (Self Addressed Stamped Envelope). There will be a Query section in the news letter to answer your querys. In one of the latter Letters I will print out a list of the persons who served in the Revolutionary War, war of 1812, and the war of the Rebellion, so you may use these as a base to work on if you want to join one of the society's such as the DAR, Daughters of the Confederacy or what ever. Please note: A CORY is a CORY no matter how you spell it.

OUR AMERICAN CORY'S

I will print here information compiled from our former genealogical researchers eg John M Cory Leavensworth Ks, Rev N E Cory Augusta II, James E Cory of Shelby Oh, and Stanley Cory Green Valley Az,. These are our First and formost researchers of the Cory Clam in America. These men have traveled extensivly throughout the Americas and England. As an introductory to these apparently well verrified accounts, here are a few isolated facts which are "of record". The Corie lands in the southern part of an old parish named Corie in Dumfrieshire, Scotland, were held by a family whose surname was Corie as early as the twelfth century.. Robert de Corry recieved a grant of land in the twenty-third year of the reign of David II of Scotland, 1354: and again in the fortleth year of his reign. 1371.. Robert Corry was Knighted during the reign of David II of Scotland in 1632...We find a Sir Robert Corry of Annandale Scotland, was granted a safe conduct by Edward III of England, with mounted escort...A Robert Corie left Annandale, Scotland, and settled in Norfolk, England. In 1399 he purchased an estate in Braemerton, near Norwich, since known as Braemerton Hall. His decendants lived in the old hall until 1682, when on failure of direct line the estate passed by marriage to the Houghtons. There may have been or it appears that there were two Robert Corie's. one in Dumfries, Scotland and one in Norfolk, England. It must be remembered that at the time of the Norman Conquest of England in the Eleventh century many of the families of England were driven up into Scotland, and that Dumfries, and other border counties of Scotland were largely settled by those fleeing from the injustice and exactions of William The Conqueror and his Norman followers. Keeping this in mind, it is quit conceivable that there might have been a CORY family in Norfolk, England and a CORY family in Dumfries, Scotland, which were of the same family. Never the less we do believe our Roots started with one Robert CORY who purchased Breamerton Hall in 1698...Robert1, William2, Francis3, Thomas4, Robert5, John6, Thomas7,:Thomas had four sons, who came to America John, Thomas, William and Giles. (Not Proven) JOHN; came to America prior to 1640, reaching Boston. He is found with others in 1640 assisting Rev. John Young to organize the First Presbyterian Church in Southold, Sag Harbor, Long Island, New York. Southold is where he lived and died. John was a weaver by trade. He had seven Children. THOMAS; Settled in Chelmford, Mass where he was granted land in 1662, he was alive in 1701, he married Abigail Goole 18 Feb 1649. He had ten children.

WILLIAM; Settled in Portsmouth Ri.He was granted land there December 10, 1657, He married Mary Earle about 1655, he died January 4, 1682 and his widow married Joseph Timberlake. William had ten Children. Giles; Lived in Salem, Ma. First married to Margaret, had four children, John, Christine, Elizabeth and Deliverance. He then on 11 April 1664 married Mary Brite, she died in 1684. He then married Martha who was on 22 September 1692 hung from a popular tree as a witch. By due process of law on Sep 16,1692 Giles was pressed to death in an open field for refusing to plead to an indictment against him for witch craft, He was 83 years old.

GREAT CORY

There is one date in English history which every schoolchild knows; it is 1066. In that year William of Normandy defeated the Anglo Saxon King Harold of England at the celebrated Battle of Hastings. William "The Conqueror" seized power and at a stroke made himself owner of all lands in the country. He ousted the Anglo Saxon hierarchy and substituted his Norman friends and relations in all the nations settlements, towns, villages, and manors. Among the places which changed hands was the small manor of CHORI situated in North Cornwall and some 11 miles from the ancient town of Launceston. A manor was an agricultural subsistence unit, controlled by a thegen before 1066, which supported itself on a communal basis. All the inhabitants took part in the field operations, the Thegen reserving some land to himself and drawing a tribute from the families of the manor. Until the conquest, CHORI had been part of the estates of Earl Godwin, the powerful head of the great province of Wessex. His Cornish manors were then handed over to the Norman Count of Mortain. Mortain revived huge but scattered land grants throughout the Kingdom and the inhabitants of CHORI would have seen little of him though they would have experienced a new military emphasis from their new masters. Our knowledge of the organization of the country owes much to a remarkable survey undertaken by the efficient William in 1086. The DOMESDAY survey catalogued land settlements in detail listing Saxon owners and Norman successors, land areas, values, manpower and farm resources; to include CHORI. Expert authorities (notably Farley and Phillimore) have identified the location of CHORI with Great CORY in Boyton Parish. Unfortunately by an unexplained corruption of the name in the 19th century the place is now known as West Curry. It seems likely that Great Cory was an Anglo-Saxon settlement rather than an original Celtic site, though this is not known with certainty. At a time when surnames were unknown the people of the manor would probably have used the place name after their first names eg "Leofric of CHORI" for the benefit of outsiders. Though there is no early record of any individual it is believed that the name persisted as a surname in the hamlet and in surrounding parishes down the ages. The evidence is provided by a heavy concentration of the CORY names reveald bythe international genealogical index to have existed for centuries within a 25 mile radius of Great CORY. From the district, and quite possibly from Launceston town Robert CORY migrated to Norwich in 1398 to found the large East Anglian "dynasty". Today Great CORY (or West Curry) is an unpretentious hamlet comprising a farm house and some separate dwellings.

Alas! There are no CORY's! It bears no obvious suggestion of its long history but scrutiny of an old Ordnance Survey map shows that some field boundaries, now straightened, once showed some evidence of open field "furlongs"- an ancient system of arable cultivation. However the hamlet hasn't attracted any specific archaeological research. The wider study of the CORY's reveals a number of unconnected and ancient nuclei:-Essex(1246-1253), London (1347), Bedford(1270), Northhamptonshire (1394 etc. It is not vet possible to prove or disprove whether these centers arose from migrant CORY's. The possibility of other origins must remain an open question since the records from ancient times list transactions and events rather than genealogical information. However, we may conclude that CORY (CHORI) is a name of great antiquity. From the medieval plow-man following his ox-team on the windy Cornish uplands to his modern descendant much has happened. Let us strive to supplement our knowledge as far as we possibly can. Vernon CORY January 1989
