Charles Barney CORY, son of Barney and Eliza, Born, 31 Jan 1857, in Boston, Suffolk Co MA. He was born into a comfortable household thanks to his father and Grand father who successful very shipping business, and had a good inheritance. However, he suffered a heavy financial loss in 1906. he died, 29 July 1921, in Ashland WI (Buried in Boston MA). Charles was a direct descendant of one of our fathers, William of founding Tiverton. He was educated at the Lawrence Scientific School of Harvard University, at Boston Mass. As an American ornithologist, he was a Honorary curator of the Boston Society of Natural History and from 1895 was non resident curator of ornithology at the field Natural History Museum of Chicago, was head of his department death 1921. his in established one of the first Bird sanctuaries in the United states, at Hyannis, Massachusetts, where he had an estate at the time. It is there that he discovered a new bird, a deep sea species now known "Cory's Shearwater" (Puffinus as diomedea borealis). He traveled extensively studying birds in the West Indies and South America. In doing so he compiled a considerable collection of species, many recorded and preserved for the first time. Charles also was the author of many books, "Hypnotism and "Montezuma's Castle", Memorism", some Madrigal plays and some Sea Chanteys: "Ship's work songs". His most important work was the first two volumes of "Birds of America" (1918-1919), the remainder was completed posthumously by Dr Hellmayr of Munich Germany.

In 1890, J. Edward Corey renovated the choir loft and foyer of the First Universal Church of Southold, Long Island, NY. A century later, Ros Corey, a family descendant, has been at work on the church again: this time on the steeple.

The steeple of the First Universalist built in 1836, and the oldest church in the area and is a familiar Southold landmark. Its central pole is a part of the village's "liberty Pole", erected in 1776 in celebration of the independence. Under the combined impact of dry rot, wet rot and the 1985 hurricane, the steeple is showing its age.

Ros Corey, a master carver and member of the congregation, has painstakenly copied the approximately 150 pieces of the old steeple spires in his basement workshop.

ENGLAND

Vernon is our English cousin, he and his associate will be submitting material for our quarterly News Letter, on our English Heritage.

Great CORY
There is one date in English history which every English school child knows: it is 1066. In that year William of Normandy defeated the Anglo Saxon King Harold of England at the celebrated Battle of Hastings. William "The Conqueror" seized power and at a stroke, made himself owner of all the land in the country. He ousted the Anglo Saxon Hierarchy and substituted his Norman friends and relations in all the nation's settlements, towns, villages and manors. Amongst the places which changed hands was the small manor of CHORI, situated in North Cornwall and some 11 miles from the ancient town of Lauceston.

A manor was an agricultural subsistence unit, controlled by a Thegn before 1066, which supported itself on a communal basis. All the inhabitants took part in the field operations, the Thegn reserving some lands for himself and drawing a tribute from the families of the manor. Until the conquest, CHORI had been a part of the estates of Earl Godwin, the powerful head of the great provence of Wessex. His Cornish manors were then handed over to the Norman count of Mortain. Mortain received huge but scattered land grants throughout the Kingdom and the inhabitants of CHORI would have seen little of him though they would have experienced a new military emphasis from their new masters.

Our knowledge of the organization of the country owes much to a remarkable survey undertaken by the efficient William in 1086. The DOMESDAY survey catalogued land settlements in detail, listing Saxon owners and Norman successors, land areas, values, manpower and farm resources: and it included CHORI. Expert authorities (notably Farley and Phillimore) have identified the location of CHORI, with Great Cory in Boyton Parish. Unfortunately by an unexplained corruption of the name in the 19th century the place is now known as West Curry.

It seems likely that Great Cory was an Anglo Saxon settlement rather than an original Celtic site, though this is not known with certainty, at a time when surnames were unknown the people of the manor would probably have used the place name after their first name ie "Leofric of Chori" for the benefit of outsiders. Though there is no early record of any individual, but is believed that the name persisted as a surname in the hamlet and in the surrounding parishes down through the ages. The evidence is provided by a heavy concentration of Cory names revealed by the International Genealogical Index to have existed for centuries within a 25 mile radius of Great Cory. It is from this district, and quite possibly from Launcston town Robert Cory migrated to Norwich in 1398 to found the large East Aglian "Dynasty".

Today Great Cory (or West Curry) is an unpretentious hamlet comprising a farm house and some separate dwellings, but, alas, there are no Cory's. The wider study of the Cory's reveals a number of unconnected and ancient nuclei. The possibility of another origin must remain an open question since the records from ancient time list transactions and events rather than genealogical information.

However, we may conclude that CORY (CHORI) is a name of great antiquity. From the medieval ploughman following his ox team on the windy Cornish uplands to his modern descendant much has happened. Let us strive to supplement our knowledge as far as we possibly can.

HISTORICAL TIDBITS

SOUTHOLD

The township of Southold, the oldest of the towns on Long Island New York was first settled probably a year or two prior to 1640. On the 21st of October the first church is on record as being organized. Some of the earliest landowners was our John Cory, on record as whale Commissioner in 1640. and Matthew Sunderland who 8th June 1639 lease on lands in this township. After erecting a building he sold this land and dwelling to Thomas Weatherby for £15.5s. There seems to be authentic evidence that Southold contained several settlers prior to the complete organization of the first church

MASSACHUSETTS

Early Settlers οf generally Massachusetts came from England and Scotland. Plymouth Colony was established in 1620 from the settlers on the Mayflower. The Colony eventually spread to cover area οf today's Plymouth. Barnstable and Bristol counties. In 1630 Massachusetts Colony was founded. It expanded to today's area of Essex. Middlesex, Old Norfolk. part of Hampshire), and Suffolk counties. In 1691 a new charter was granted to Massachusetts Bay Colony uniting it with Plymouth Colony. Parts of Maine and Nova Scotia were also added Massachusetts. The Revolutionary war began at Lexington and Concord. In 1786 the Ohio Land Company

formed, resulting in the emigration οf many Massachusetts residents to Ohio. Maine was separated Massachusetts made state in 1820. а During the civil War between 1861 and 1865 146,000 men served in the Union Army.

RHODE ISLAND

Religious dissenters in 1636. came from Massachusetts and founded Providence. Settlements followed soon Portsmouth. Newport and Warwick. Each town had its own government and kept their own deed, probate and vital records. In 1663 a royal charter created the United Colony of Rhode and Island providence Plantations. Rhede_Island. the gained towns of Bristol. Little Compton. Tiverton and Warren from Massachusetts in 1747. Then in 1862 Rhode Island gained of part the town of Pawtucket from Mass and Massachusetts received Fall River, which earlier had been the northern part of Tiverton. Rhode Island was the last of the thirteen colonies to ratify the Constitution to become a state. During the Civil War Island Rhode provided 25,000 men for the Union Army.

OHIO

In 1787 the United states government established the Northwest Territory, to open land to revolutionary War veterans and other settlers. The first white settlement was established at Marietta. In honor of

the first president, first county to be formed was called Washington. Our ancestor Aaron immigrated 1800 Ohio in settled in what is now kn own as Tus car awas County, which was formed in 1808. Between 1810 and 1840 many more settlers came by steamboat on the Ohio River and Lake Erie. and by new canals, roads railroads. Ohio provided 310,000 men who served with the Union during the civil war.

IOWA

Iowa was part of the ofLouisiana purchase 1803. but it remained Indian land and was not opened for settlement until 1833. The first permanent settlements were in Eastern Iowa. Between 1831 and 1851 a series of treaties extinguished Indian claims to the land. Then after Iowa being part of the Wisconsin Michigan and Territories. the Iowa Territory was established in' 1838, it included all of the present day Iowa. Minnesota and parts οf North and South Dakota. Iowa with its present boundaries was made state in 1846. Between 1850 and 1860 Iowa tripled population immigrants poured in from older midwestern states. Francis Cory his wife Isabel, along with seven boys migrated from Ohio to Sac County in 1854. Over 75.000 Iowans served in the Union Armed forces during the Civil War.
