We welcomed all with open arms and a daily meeting at the English Pub (the local hangout at the Holiday Inn in Tewksbury). Kathleen [Thomas Cory] Reed of Maine along with her executive

committee made a point of filling each day with many activities for the annual meeting. The following summarizes the adventures of “The Cor[e]y Clan”.

Wednesday, June 22, 2005: “Welcome”

In the evening, we socialized at The Pub where we met new Corys, friends of Corys, and renewed old Cory friendships. We also received information for the week’s activity. Thursday, June 23, 2005: “Salem Day”

The day was spent visiting the Salem area and sites associated with the Witch Hysteria (a.k.a. Witch Hunt). This included the following activities: Salem Village Witchcraft Victims Memorial in Danvers; an excursion to the Rebecca Nurse Homestead and recreation of the Salem Village Meeting House in Danvers; live reenactment of Salem Witch Trials at the Witch Dungeon Museum in Salem; self guided walk-about of Salem; and driving around Peabody looking for the location of Giles Cory’s last known residence.

Friday, June 24, 2005: “Shot Heard Round the World”

Friday morning we roamed around the Chelmsford Forefathers Burying Ground. A few were successful in finding Cory headstones. They took pictures and promised to share them with us. The remainder of the day was “Revolution Day”. We started at Concord where our guide, Joseph L. “Joel” Andrews met us. We traveled the route from Lexington to Concord, reviewing the history that led up to the battle of Lexington and Concord where the Colonists fought the “Red Coats”. This included driving through Minute Man National Park.

Saturday, June 25, 2005: “Battles”

Saturday morning we were bussed to the Chelmsford (pronounced chams-ferd) Garrison House. We were greeted by very knowledgeable guides of the Chelmsford Historical Society that talked about life in a political garrison in the early 1700s. From there we went to Boston, The North End. We visited The Old North Church (of Paul Revere fame) where a lantern was hung to indicate the “Red Coats” were coming (Longfellow “... one if by sea, two if by land”). The next stop included self-guided tours of Bunker Hill and Old Ironsides.

DNA report by Art Corey and Ida Birch

The Cory Society [UK] Report – Ida Birch: Ida Birch read The Cory Society [UK] DNA report written by Margaret Goffin. The American Cory Family Society helped a lot with respect to funding and contacts. When funding is limited, it is wise to be very selective when choosing a candidate. England is currently looking for a male Cory whose descendants are from Bristol. It was recommended that we add the report to the next newsletter. It is requested that an electronic copy be sent to those that have elected to receive their newsletter electronically.

The Cory Family Society Report [USA] – Art Corey: There was a question about how can we depend on these results. Art said that we submitted duplicate DNA to 3 different laboratories. The results were identical. So far, 36 people have had their DNA tested; 22 from USA and 14 from the UK (5 were tested this year).

Discussion followed to identify which line and who to test for DNA. We still need to

identify the John of Southold, Long Island line. The cost of a DNA test is \$155 for a 26 sites/measurements test.

DNA Discussion by Fred Corey: Where are we going with respect to DNA? Is it going to change into an archaeological project? This is just something to investigate and think about.

\$400 Donation to the Cory Society

We intend to help the UK Cory Society as much as we can. Their information will greatly benefit us. Earl Cory motioned that another \$400 be donated to the Cory Society. Galen Moore seconded the motion. It passed.

Addition to the Newsletter and Website: A request for a donation to DNA research will be added to the newsletters and website. Also we will encourage people to participate in the DNA project. We need to set the society DNA goals and encourage DNA testing.

Officers

President: Fred Corey expressed a concern about his ability to devote the time needed to preside as President. We are trying to encourage Mark Hester to rejoin us as an officer.

Newsletter Editor: Art nominated Kathleen Reed as the newsletter editor with a second from Brenda Miller. Vote: Unanimous. Art will be responsible for the next newsletter, after that, Kathleen will begin getting out three newsletters annually. Art Corey will continue as DNA project supervisor/coordinator.

Next Meeting

Next Proposed USA Meeting: We will look for someone in the DC area to host a meeting in the Fall 2006.

Next English Meeting: The English are planning a trip to Kent, England (South

East from London) around the weekend of May 20th, 2006. Currently, the date is not finalized.

Miscellaneous

Harpole: A special thanks to the Harpole group for last years meeting. It is still the best ever meeting for the Cory Family Society.

Honorary Memberships: There was a motion by Fred Cory, to make the Richard Cory Family of California, Mary Cory, of Harrogate and Michael and Frances Cory of Dorset, England honorary members of the Cory Family Society. The motion was seconded by Art Corey. The motion passed.

Dues will be increased to \$12 annually except for those who have already paid in advance. **Dues Paid:** The following people paid dues at the meeting:

SURNAME VARIATIONS

Typically beginners investigating their family history confine their search of documents bearing their surname as spelled by their parents. They make the assumption that other spellings must refer to folks unrelated to their own ancestors. Experienced genealogists have learned that attributing too much weight to a particular surname spelling is a mistake.

A variety of spellings are likely to be associated with almost all Anglo-Saxon

surnames, including Cory and Corey. Unfortunately, this is a problem that those of us addicted to searching our roots must learn to live with, as Ida Birch, editor of the English Cory Family Newsletter, has shown in articles presented in her April and December 2004 Newsletters.

For the benefit of our new members, in particular, the article representing much research on Ida's part are reproduced below.

CORY - Its Variants and Deviants by Ida Birch ----*Printed in the April 2004 issue of The English Cory Society Newsletter*

Variants and deviants? I imagine the reader being at ease with Cory variants but deviants? What is a Cory deviant?

The GOONS with which we are registered has been carrying articles in its *Journal of One-Name Studies* on the subject of names and how similar names should be viewed. Derek Palgrave, in his article in the January-March 2004 issue, divided the variations on his name into variants and 'deviants', for want of a better description. Therefore, I undertook the task on behalf of our committee of looking at possible ways Cory appears in records of all kinds and which we consider to be variants.

I drew up the table below to represent the different combinations of letters which sound like Cory. The table could be reproduced with the initial letter 'C' replaced by 'K'. This would include KORY, originally registered with the Guild of One Name Studies (Goons) along with those marked with an asterisk in the table above.

Of course, this caused me to trawl the records, correlating current and auld, with care! I do not claim that the table of names is complete as more turned up as I searched the records!

Possible spellings by the scribe or arising from the transcription of the written word, whether clearly written or not.

The records searched fall into two categories:

1) A wide span of dates:

IGI on Familysearch web-site. Most of us are familiar with this source but it has its drawbacks in that (10 search to an exact spelling restricts the choice to no more detail than “British Isles”. Many are recorded as 200+ which suffices for our requirements in this study.

Cornwall FHS composite data-base from their web-site: this includes sources mainly from parish registers, monumental inscriptions and census returns.

2) Specific dates:

1851 census disk for Devon, Norfolk and Warwickshire

1881 census from Surname Atlas, software available from Stephen Archer

1901 census from PRO web-site - extractions by Margaret Goffin and Ida Birch

2000 London Telephone Directory

The Variants

The committee has concluded that the variants of Cory are Corey, Corie, and Corye, and Jean Hayes has amended our registration with the GOONS. [We have dropped Kory included in members’ research and and Coury as these have not always been included in members research and numbers are small. While the Cory Society had these listed, others were precluded from registering these names.]

In the April issue (No 33), I explained that following the publication by the GOONS [Guild of One-Name Studies] of articles on surnames in its journal, our committee reconsidered our registration with the GOONS and had reached the conclusion that Corey, Corie and Corye are variants of Cory and any other spelling is a deviant. It is therefore our duty, as a Society, to collect all references to Cory, Corey, Corie and Corye and I welcome contributions from ALL members. I hasten to add that supplying records is not a condition of your membership but perhaps you have found references of no

interest to you which could be of great significance to someone else!

By concentrating on Cory and the variants, one should not forget that our Cory families can also be found in the deviants of which I give a few examples below:

COERY

My thanks to Michael R Cory for an excellent example of variations in the spelling of the surname. His ancestor the Rev James Cory (1733-1793), Vicar of Sherford and Kettlestone in Norfolk baptised his own children – they are

recorded in the register in three different ways – some Cory, others Corey or Coery. No one can claim that he was uneducated-he also held the post of Headmaster of the Perse School, Cambridge.

CORE

I was searching the 1861 census for my ancestor James Cory at a Rotherhithe address gleaned from a certificate but alas - as so often happens – the family had moved. Idly scanning the pages as I rewound the film, “James Cor” popped out of the film - as it does when one is tuned to searching for a particular surname - under the name Core! I must admit that I had previously considered this deviant unlikely! With another ‘e’ yes, but Core does not read as a two syllable word. Had this been indexed, I would have had to look under Core to find it.

CORRY

Several people when speaking of the ‘Cory’ family pronounce the name ‘Corry, rhyming with ‘sorry’. Therefore it is understandable that this variant occurs in census returns, for instance, where the spoken word is interpreted by the enumerator. Our chairman’s ancestor is recorded as Richard Corry, barrister, of Langdon Court, Wembury, Devon in the 1901 census.

The Rev Thomas James Cory, a Bible Christian Minister, was the subject of Kate Pearce’s interesting article in the December issue 2003 on his voyage to Australia. A website detailing the list of passengers on the ship Cuzco records him as Corry when he emigrated to Australia in 1877.

CARY

Cary has to be considered - especially in older records - not because it is a variant of Cory but because lower case ‘a’ and ‘o’

can be so easily confused. Even as late as the 1901 census, Cory families appear as Cary in St Juliot, Cornwall.

CURY

Another instance in the 1901 Census returns – this time Cury – for Jean Hayes’s ancestor Charles Cory at Barnstaple, Devon. Jean tells me that it was written in beautiful copperplate but with a slight gap in the top of the ‘o’, the transcriber reading it as a ‘u’. All the people below were recorded as ‘do’ (ditto) so there was not another chance to see the surname.

CURRY

Many families in the counties of Devon and Cornwall - especially western Cornwall – can be found under Curry. This includes the family of Vernon Cory, one of our founder members whose family was in the Camborne/Crowan area.

COZIE

The index of the Prerogative Court of Canterbury (PCC) wills went online last year and images of the wills were available at £3 per will, currently £3.50! This facility provided by the The National Archives (the renamed Public Record Office) enabled me to check my extracts from the printed volumes of wills indexes. Access to the period 1801-1852 was previously available in the original form only, ie, large annual volumes of manuscript calendars under initial letter only. Thus, one had to search through the complete list of ‘C’s to find Cory and variants – a time consuming task of which I had completed half. The online list filled the gap and I obtained four more wills. But where was the 1583 record of Richard Corie of Whalesborough, Marhamchurch, Cornwall whose will I had purchased in the early days of my research? By searching for ‘Cornwall’ rather than a surname I found him as Richard Cozie! Taking another look at

this will I could see why this had happened. Are there other Corys out there hidden under Cozie?

Should you not be able to find an ancestor or relative, you may be successful by widening the search - take a look at all the possibilities.

The table demonstrates some of the spellings which may need to be considered when researching Cory. I do not claim that all of these are connected with Cory families! Taken mainly from the IGI, I make no apologies for using this source as it is probably the most widely used 'finding aid'. And it is only a finding aid. Relevant records should always be verified in parish registers before a tree can be considered anything but a 'draft'!

Harpole Roots

I received email from Eunice Brownlee (jande.brownlee@btinternet.com), who is doing research on the Dunkley family. The oldest ancestor that we have identified in the Thomas (Harpole) Corys is Nicholas Cory. His second marriage was to Emma Dunkley in 1538. We also know of a marriage of Thomas Cory and Elizabeth Dunkley in 1539. Eunice points out that there was also a Harpole marriage between Margaret Cory and Robert Dunkley in 1538. She goes on to speculate:

We believe that there were actually two brothers and one sister Cory from Harpole at the time; thus Thomas Cory who married Elizabeth Dunkley in 1538, Nicholas Cory who married Emma (or Emily) Dunkley also in 1538, and Margaret Cory who married Robert Dunkley yet again in 1538.

Three marriages between two families all in the same period, it would seem that there may well have been land deals etc. going on here at this time with the two families sorting themselves out, however we are unable to substantiate that.

We know that the Corys were reasonably placed as were the Dunkley family (the Dunkleys originally held Althorp estate before the Spencer family) but that is all. It would be interesting to find out more of this early vintage.
