### MORE ON THE ENGLISH HOME OF THE RHODE ISLAND COR(E)Y'S

In "A Clue to the English Background of the Cor(e)y Family of Rhode Island ",in the Register, 145 [1991]:122-24, Jane Fletcher Fiske presented Information which pointed to Bristol, England, as the home of the parents of William¹ Cory of Portsmouth, and identified him as the son of John Cory and grandson of Ann, widow of John Roome. (Cory Family News Letter Nov 1992 Vol 7 No 4) Subsequently, the present author commissioned an English genealogist, Mrs Judith Pullin of Bristol, to search at the Gloucester Record Office in Bristol for further records of the Cory

A deed in Rhode Island from Ann Roome to William Cory conveyed property "in St.James parish in the street called St. James in the city of Bristol, in Old England" (*ibid.*,122). The street appears on a 1780 map running beside the river Frome to the corner of a churchyard of St. James Church; in the mid-seventeenth century this was, according to Mrs Pullin, an area in which merchants lived. The St. James Registers were examined, and among many entries for the name Cory were found the following which appear to relate to the Rhode Island Family:

It is clear that there have been Corys associated with the Bristol area since the time of Edward II and possibly even before that. Mrs Pullin has extracted many early records of them from various documents at the Gloucestershire Record Office, but the name was such a common one that the

construction of a pedigree for the Rhode Island family, if even possible, would require much further research.

The surname, which appears in many variant spellings both in England and in Rhode Island - Cory, Corey, Corie, Corre, Corye, Corrie, Corry, Correy, and even Cure - is especially frequent in sixteenth and seventeenth century records of the parish of St. Philip and Jacob, Bristol, suggesting that the family's earlier origins might lie there. Both there and in St. James, the given names John, William, Robert, and Thomas appear over and over again, as they do in the first few generations of the Cor(e)y family in Rhode Island.

Earlier entries for the Wauker [?Walker] family appear also in the registers of St. James. No relevant probate material for either Corys or Waukers has yet been discovered, but the Cory Family Association is conducting further research and more information may one day be available.

All references to the *Register* below are 145 (1991]: 122-24. The St James parish registers (BRO, FCP/ST.J/R/1, followed by a further citation given below), were consulted at the Gloucestershire Record Office in Bristol, England.

1. John<sup>B</sup> Corie was born probably about 1582, and was probably the John Corye, sailor, who was buried in St. James Parish, Bristol, 1 September 1621 (PRs,(A) 3). He married at St. James, 13 June 1606, Agnis Wauker (*ibid.*,(A) 2). She was probably the Ann, daughter of William Wauker and presumably his wife Alice Payne, baptized there 26 April 1582 (*ibid.*, (A) 1), and she died after 22 October 1669 but before 1670, at Portsmouth, Rhode Island (*Register*). She married, second, at St James, Bristol, 25 May1622, JOHN ROOME, a merchant, with whom she evidently

emigrated to Rhode Island(PRs,(A) 3.,Register). Her name appears in Rhode Island records as Ann, Anna, and Annis. In 1667 she deeded to her grandson William Corrie Property in Bristol which had belonged to her late husband, and a document confirming the deed in 1669 refers to William's father as John Corey, Deceased (Register).

iv Thomas, bp 19 Sept.1613: Probably the Thomas buried at St. James 26 March 1623 (ibid.,(A) 3)

2.John<sup>A</sup> Cory (John) was baptized in St James Parish, Bristol, 6 April 1611 (PRs, (A) 2), and he may have died in England by 1638, but was certainly dead by 1669 (Register). Court records suggest that he was in Rhode Island in 1643 (Rhode Island Colony Records, Book 1 [ms. R.I. archives, microfilm at the Society], 27: see Register for details), but no further record of him on him has been found in New England (Ed note: maybe John I of Southold?)

Record of his marriage and the name of his wife have not been found. According to the copy of a document given to his son William to carry with him on a voyage to England, "John Correy ... was sometime inhabitant in or near the City of Bristoll in England .... "(Register).

### A TYPICAL OUTING WITH THE CORY CLAN AT A REUNION

Portsmouth Reunion August 1993

began tour in Saturdays Portsmouth, RI at the Northwest corner of West Main Rd and Cory's Lane, where William Cory<sup>1</sup> received his eight acre land grant in 1657. He also inherited the adjoining thirtyeight acre land grants of his step-grandfather and Grandmother, Ann and John Roome. His two sons John<sup>2</sup> and William<sup>2</sup>, inherited this land in 1682. On the south side of Cory's Lane we stopped at the old cemetary where Samuel<sup>5</sup> Cory the Revolutionary War Patriot buried.

Crossing the bridge to Tiverton we passed over lot 22 of the Pocasset Purchase William purchased in 1680 and left to his son's, Thomas<sup>2</sup> and Roger<sup>2</sup>. South to Tiverton Four Corners we stopped at five Corv homes built before the Revolution, including the Cory-Hicks-Bordon home purchased by Thomas<sup>2</sup> Cory in 1720, and remained in possession of his descendants until 1900; the home built by his grandson, Philip<sup>4</sup> Cory c1770: and the Chase Cory House purchased by Andrew<sup>5</sup> Cory in 1816 and occupied by his descendants until 1966 when it was donated to the Tiverton Historical Society. We visited the cemetery on the land of Capt Philip<sup>4</sup> Cory, where he, his wife and descendants are buried. At the Chase Cory House we were greeted by Edna Snell who lived there as a child more than ninety years ago.

Continuing east our tour headed for Westport Pointe, MA by the way of Cornell Rd where we passed the land purchased by William Cory in 1669, which he left to his son, Caleb<sup>2</sup>. Our bus stopped at the cemetery in Westport Pointe where Capt Isaac<sup>4</sup> Cory, a grandson of Thomas<sup>2</sup> Cory of Tiverton, and his descendants are buried. We were met there by Mr Dexter and Mr Wadsworth, both descendants of

Alexander<sup>6</sup> Cory, a grandson of Isaac<sup>4</sup> Corv. who were our guides for the half a mile stroll down Main Rd to the tip of the point. During the Revolution Capt Isaac<sup>4</sup> Cory built his store that would remain active until 1915. This store would be the focal point for his whaling, coastal trading and fishing business. We passed by beautiful old homes, many built soon after Revolutionary War, including the home of Capt Isaac<sup>4</sup> still owned by his descendants. Isaac4 inherited lands in Westport from his father. Cory in 1750, that still remain in the possession of his descendants.

Our last stop was the Whaling Museum in New Bedford, MA where we viewed some papers from their collection of Isaac<sup>4</sup> Cory papers.

Sunday morning we visited the North Kingstown, RI "Homestead" land purchased by John<sup>2</sup> Corey c 1705 son of William<sup>1</sup> Cory of Portsmouth RI. This land and home was owned by his descendants until 1901. In 1941 the land was made part of the Quonset Naval Air Station and at this time the grave "Homestead in the stones Cemetery" were moved to the Ouidnessett Cemetery. Many pictures were taken by his descendants at this cemetery. The two oldest marked J.C. and E.C. are thought to be those of John<sup>3</sup> Corey and his wife, Elizabeth. John<sup>2</sup>, William<sup>1</sup>.

#### A STUDY OF WILLIAM SALMON OF SOUTHOLD

Was he the father of Ann, Wife of John Cory I

It has long been assumed that the father of Ann Cory of Southold, was William Salmon of Hashamomuck. Why has this assumption been perpetuated and what proof do we have of this relationship either primary or secondary. Histories by Capt James Cory, Harriet Dickenson the first edition of Harry Harmon Cory do not even mention the possible relationship with William Salmon. So how did this "rumor" get started. The only citing that anyone can use that might point to a relationship between Ann and William Salmon is that in 1645 William Salmon gave him [John Cory] "for being his neighbor," a home lot and lands in Hashamomack for two cows and twelve goats. This is far from proof that William Salmon was the father in law of John Cory.

What do we know of William Salmon? Recently in the genealogy section of the Seattle Public Library I ran across a pamphlet entitled "Study of the 1658 and 1686 Depositions of Thomas Osman and Early History of Hashamomuck in the Town of Southold, Long Island," by Wesley Baker, 1946. The following is the section from this pamphlet relating to William Salmon.

"William Salmon age 25, Thomas Reeve age 24, and Thomas Terrill age 18, sailed from England in May 1635 on a ship bound for St. Christopher's Island in the West Indies. They embarked in the Matthew of London, per warrant from the Earle of Carlisle (Hotten's Emigrants, Page 80). They did not necessarily disembark at St. Christopher's for their ship probably made several stops before returning to England. The Osman Deposition indicates that these three men, with Thomas Benedict and others met Osman in the Cowan country, which was then part of Virginia.

....in the printed Southold Town Records, the following note by J.W. Case appears (page 178). Note. By the deed of sale of his home lot, William Salmon to James Haines, April 1659. It appears that he lived at Southold before he married widow Sinderland and moved to Hashamomack. At Southold he plied his trade of a Blacksmith. Matthew Sinderland, the husband of Katherine, who married William Salmon, was a seaman of Boston and an agent of James Farrett and appears to have been in possession of Hashamomack at the time of his death, which happened about 1642 to 1645. Although no deed or grant therefor or for any other land in Southold as found upon the records, to him. Very soon after William married the widow, he took full possession of Hashamomack or at least the Indian title to it of the Indian Chief, Paukhamp. On 8th of October 1649, he sold three-fourths of Hashamomack, reserving to himself the neck on the Bay, to Henry Whitney, Edward Tredwell and Thomas Benedict. His wife Katherine (Sinderland) died leaving one son, John and three daughters, Katherine, Marie and Elizabeth. William Salmon died in 1656 or 1657, leaving his Widow Sarah and six children, all minors.

According to this study, William Salmon was age 25 in 1635, which would place his birth year about 1610. He would have been the approximate age as John I and could not have been his father-in-law. In addition, the Will of William Salmon indicates that he left six children and they were all minors. It is clear that William Salmon was not the father of Ann Cory. At least no proof has been found to indicate such. Who were Ann's parents?? We may never know the answer, however if we can go beyond speculation and continue the search an answer may emerge.
